OSHA REPORTS DECREASE IN CONSTRUCTION FATALITIES TIED TO TRENCH COLLAPSES AND FALLS

OSHA has reported a significant drop in workplace fatalities requiring investigation in the past year, attributed to intensified safety enforcement and increased collaboration.

According to a recent release, preliminary numbers indicate that federal OSHA investigated 826 worker deaths in fiscal year 2024, a reduction of 11 percent from 928 investigations in 2023. Excluding COVID-related cases, this is the lowest number of fatalities since 2017. In particular, OSHA reports a notable decrease in deaths related to trench collapses and falls, two of the leading causes of fatalities in construction.

These numbers are promising evidence that stronger enforcement and collaboration with labor and management, driven by the Biden-Harris administration's workercentered approach, is saving lives," OSHA Assistant Secretary Douglas Parker said in a statement. "Most striking is the improvement in areas we have focused on with employers and unions. Our state program partners have also seen improvements."

Fatalities from falls investigated by federal OSHA dropped nearly 20 percent, from 234 to 189, while state OSHA programs reported a 15 percent decline. Trench collapses showed a decrease of nearly 70 percent since 2022, from 39 in 2022 to 15 in 2023, with 12 so far in 2024. OSHA credits this improvement to a strict "zero tolerance" policy, which includes prompt inspections and criminal referrals for unsafe trench practices.

"While fewer workers have died from the hazards OSHA investigates, we still lose more than 5,000 workers each year in largely preventable incidents. While we're proud of this progress, our work is far from over," Parker said. "Reducing worker deaths means embracing an approach that makes worker health and safety a core value in every workplace. Only then can we fully address all the causes and factors that lead to workers dying needlessly on the job."

U.S. BENEFICIAL OWNERSHIP INFORMATION REGISTRY

The U.S. Department of the Treasury's Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN) is accepting *beneficial ownership information reports*. The bipartisan Corporate Transparency Act, enacted in 2021 to curb illicit finance, requires many companies doing business in the United States to report information about the individuals who ultimately own or control them.

Filing is simple, secure, and free of charge. Companies that are required to comply ("reporting companies") must file their initial reports by the following deadlines:

- Existing companies: Reporting companies created or registered to do business in the US before January 1, 2024 must file by January 1, 2025.
- Newly created or registered companies: Reporting companies created or registered to do business in the US in 2024 have 90 calendar days to file after receiving notice that their company's creation or registration is effective.

Beneficial ownership information reporting is not an annual requirement. A report only needs to be submitted once, unless the filer needs to update or correct information. Generally, reporting companies must provide four pieces of information about each beneficial owner:

- name;
- date of birth;
- address; and
- the identifying number and issuer from either a non-expired U.S. driver's license, a non-expired U.S. passport, or a non-expired identification document issued by a State (including a U.S. territory or possession), local government, or Indian tribe. If none of those documents exist, a non-expired foreign passport can be used. An image of the document must also be submitted.

The company must also submit certain information about itself, such as its name(s) and address. In addition, reporting companies created on or after January 1, 2024, are required to submit information about the individuals who formed the company ("company applicants").

FinCEN is committed to providing America's small businesses with the resources and information they need to make filing as quick and easy as possible. FinCEN's **Small Entity Compliance Guide** walks small businesses through the requirements in plain language. Filers can also view informational videos and webinars, find answers to frequently asked questions, connect to the contact center, and learn more about how to report at www.fincen.gov/boi.

MANDATORY SEXUAL HARASSMENT PREVENTION TRAINING

Public Act 101-0221 (commonly referred to as the Workplace Transparency Act), requires Illinois employers to provide sexual harassment prevention training to their employees on an annual basis, regardless of the size of the company.

Under this law, Illinois employers have until December 31st each year to train employees on sexual harassment prevention. The Act provides minimum standards that must be included in the training. To assist your business in complying with this new law, the Illinois Department of Human Rights has posted the following information on its website:

- A FAQ for Sexual Harassment Prevention Training
- Minimum Sexual Harassment Prevention Training Standards for All Employers

Employers must either develop their own sexual harassment prevention training program that equals or exceeds the minimum standards for sexual harassment prevention training outlined in Section 2-109(B) of the Illinois Human Rights Act, or they may use the model training provided by the IDHR. The model training program can be downloaded by

Question

We had to close our office for a few days due to the recent storms. Are employees entitled to be paid for the days we were closed? Does it matter if the employees are exempt or nonexempt? All our employees are paid a salary, but some are exempt and some are nonexempt.



An employer's obligation to pay employee wages during weather-related absences depends on whether the salaried employee is exempt from federal Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) requirements and whether the employer remains open during the weather emergency.

The U.S. Department of Labor considers an exempt employee who does not report to work during a weather emergency to be absent from work for personal reasons when their employer remains open for business. Employers can lawfully deduct or withhold the employee's wages for every full day that the employee does not report for work. However, salaried exempt employees who report to work—regardless of how late they report or how many hours they work that day-must be paid for a full day's work.

If closed due to weather, employers must compensate salaried exempt employees for being ready, willing and able to work. However, exempt employees do not need to be paid for any full workweek in which they perform no work.

Determining payment for nonexempt employees is more straightforward. The FLSA requires employers to compensate their nonexempt employees only for the hours nonexempt employees actually work. An employer does not have to compensate a nonexempt employee for time not worked due to a weather emergency. Employers should check their state and local laws for any additional rules that may apply.
