



## LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The Spring Session of the 104th Illinois General Assembly has now passed the deadline for substantive bills to be out of their chamber of origin. Those that have not are considered dead for this session unless an extension date is noted. Many of the bills that have come forward the last few weeks were shell bills with substantive language added by amendment. We are still working to identify any of those bills that may have an effect on our industry. Below are the bills we have been actively tracking and their current status.

#### Plumbing/Piping/Trade Related Bills:

HB 1051 (D. VELLA) Amends the Illinois Water Well Construction Code. Provides that the minimum lateral setback distance between a closed-loop well and a storm sewer, sanitary sewer, combined sewer, or any other potential source of contamination is 5 feet. Re-referred to House Rules.

HB 1112 (J. DAVIS) Amends the School Code to allows METT Educator District Licenses for teaching a course in manufacturing, engineering, technology, or a trade (including plumbing) to be issued. Referred to House Rules.

**HB 1370 (D. DIDECH)** Amends the Environmental Protection Act to provide that after January 1, 2030, no person shall sell in the State a new washing machine for residential or commercial use unless the washing machine contains a microfiber filtration system. This can be an integral filter or an in-line filter. Re-referred to House Rules.

**HB 3816 (K. DU BUCLET)** Same as HB 1370. Referred to House Rules.

HB 1612 (K BUCKNER) Creates the Illinois Appliance Standards Act. Directs the Illinois EPA to adopt minimum efficiency standards for covered products. Provides for testing, certification, and labeling of covered products. These standards will apply to commercial and residential faucets, water coolers, water heaters, toilets, urinals, showers, irrigation controllers and more. Re-referred to House Rules.

**SB 1582 (L. FINE)** Same as HB 1612. Referred to Senate Assignments.

HB 1809 (K. STUART) Provides that the Capital Development Board shall establish uniform statewide minimum qualification requirements for code inspectors and shall maintain a statewide registry and certification program. Re-referred to House Rules.

HB 1849 (R. SPAIN) Amends the Energy Efficient Building Act to provide that the term "Code" means the 2021 edition of the ICC's International Energy Conservation Code (currently, the latest published edition). Referred to House Rules.

HB 2391 (T. MUHL) Would allow wastewater reuse for industrial use in addition to irrigation use that was passed last year. Passed in the House and in Senate Assignments.

HB 2710 (M. KELLY) Creates an income tax credit for taxpayers who have an approved NFPA 13D residential fire sprinkler system installed in a new or existing residential dwelling in the State during the taxable year. Re-referred to House Rules.

**SB 1709 (R. MARTWICK)** Same as HB 2710. Assigned to Senate Revenue Committee. Deadline extended to May 9th.

**HB 2952 (E. HERNANDEZ)** Amends the Equitable Restrooms Act with regards to baby changing stations. Increases the number of locations where they must be installed. This may affect fixture locations for IAC/ADA compliance. Passed the House and in Senate Assignments.

**HB 3141 (J. KEICHER)** Amends the Environmental Protection Act to provide that, in the case of water main installation projects, all water main-related appurtenances, and specifically fire hydrants and valves, shall be included in the Agency's written approval of specified public water supply plans. Passed the House and assigned to Senate Local Government Committee.

SB 224 (D. DEWITTE) Same as HB 3141. Passed in the Senate and is on 2nd Reading in the House.

**SB 1723 (P. FARACI & D. KOEHLER)** Prohibits any carbon sequestration activity within a sequestration facility that overlies, underlies, or passes through a sole-source aquifer. Passed in the Senate and is on 2nd the House.

**SB 2307 (R. VENTURA)** Creates the Electrician Licensing Act, and also the Building Trades Licensing Task Force. Referred to Senate Assignments.

#### OTHER CONSTRUCTION/BUSINESS RELATED BILLS:

**HB 1224 (W. DAVIS)** Creates the State Agency Retainage Act. Provides that a percentage of the payment may be retained; prohibits the amount of retainage from exceeding 10% until 50% complete; other provisions. Amended and passed out of the House and assigned to Senate Executive Committee.

**HB 1247 (D. VELLA)** Amends the Prevailing Wage Act to provide that the definition of "public works" includes sewer inspection projects that utilize a closed-circuit television. Re-referred to House Rules.

**HB 2614 (A. NEIMERG)** Creates the Universal Recognition of Occupational Licenses Act. Referred to House Rules.

HB 3185 (W. DAVIS) Amends the State Prompt Payment Act to provide that for construction contracts with the CDB, the contractor, subcontractor, or material supplier, regardless of tier, shall not offset, decrease, or diminish payment or payments that are due to its subcontractors or material suppliers without reasonable cause. Re-referred to House Rules.

**HB 3762 (E. GONZALEZ)** Creates the Workplace Extreme Temperature Safety Act. Provides that the Director of Labor shall adopt rules to establish excessive heat and excessive cold standards. Re-referred to House Rules.





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# CONTRACTORS NEED TO COME TO WASHINGTON, DC

On April 10, Congress agreed to a budget resolution that will serve as the template for comprehensive legislation embodying the Republican majority's policy priorities, which will include reform of current U.S. tax policy.

Since passage of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (TCJA), many PHCC members report that they have benefited or stand to benefit from TCJA policies such as higher estate tax thresholds, individual income tax deductions for qualified business income, significant deductions on newly acquired equipment in the first year of its service, and a reduction in the corporate income tax rate to 21%. These policies have allowed contractors to mitigate their tax burdens, in turn allowing them to invest more in their businesses and workforce, be more resilient during periods of stagnant workflow, retain and hire more employees, and have much-needed certainty when it comes to transferring business operations to the next family generation.

However, several of these policies are set to expire at the end of this year if Congress does not take action to pass tax reform.

- Estate Tax thresholds must be at least maintained if not increased. If Congress does not pass a comprehensive tax reform package, beginning in 2026, the estate tax threshold will be cut in half from its current exemption of \$13.1 million to its pre-TCJA levels of \$6.12 million.
- Section 199A deduction prevents contractors from being taxed twice. If Congress does not pass a comprehensive tax reform package, contractors will no longer be able to deduct their qualified business income which will in essence tax them twice for their earnings. Under current statute, contractors drawing income from a qualified business entity can deduct up to 20% of those earnings on their individual returns.
- Bonus depreciation must not be allowed to sunset. Under TCJA, bonus depreciation allows contractors to deduct a larger portion of the cost of newly acquired construction equipment the first year it's placed into service rather than spreading out the expense over time, regardless of whether the equipment is brand new or used (i.e. "new to you"). Expensing under current statue stands at 40%, will be reduced to 20% in 2026, and sunsets beginning 2027. However,

the Trump administration's proposal for 100% expensing retroactive to January 20, 2025, is under serious consideration by Republican tax writers.

Congress must continue to cut the corporate rate without increasing the individual rate for certain incomes. It is unclear whether the corporate rate will be further reduced to 15%-which would allow even more businesses to thrive as we encounter economic uncertainty. But currently there are discussions to increase the individual rate up to 40% for certain incomes, negating any reduction in tax burdens at the corporate level.

Congress needs to hear from you.

- Identify your elected federal representatives on Capitol Hill and contact them to urge them to pass a comprehensive tax reform package that extends TCJA provisions to help America prosper, and reduces the corporate rate so employers can continue to thrive.

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## uestion

We have an employee who is putting in extra hours fixing mistakes in their work. Sometimes, the employee does this on their own without our asking them to fix the mistakes. Do we need to pay the employee for these extra hours since they are basically just doing the same job twice? If the work was done correctly the first time the employee did it, they wouldn't need to put in the extra hours.

Under the federal Fair Labor Standards Act, if an employer requires or allows employees to work, the time spent is probably hours worked, entitling the employees to compensation. Time spent doing work that is not requested by an employer but is still allowed is generally hours worked. The employer knows or has reason to believe that the employees are continuing to work and the employer is benefiting from the work being done. This time is commonly referred to as working off the clock.

Thus, when an employee must correct mistakes in their work, the time must be treated as hours worked. The correction of errors, or rework, is hours worked, even when the employee voluntarily does the rework. Management has a duty to exercise control and see that work is not performed if the employer does not want it to be performed. An employer cannot sit back and accept the benefits of an employee's work without considering the time spent as hours worked.

That said, in an at-will employment relationship, employers can manage employee mistakes as a performance issue. If an employee is continuously making mistakes in their work, an employer can choose to discipline the employee, up to and including termination. An employer should always consistently apply its policies, including those regarding performance management, to avoid claims of illegal discrimination or unfair treatment.

- 1. Name of the Scholarship Fund shall be the "Illinois PHCC Assn. Past President's Club Scholarship Award".

### **PHCC ILLINOIS**

### **AUXILIARY SCHOLARSHIP RULES**

Scholarships for college or vocational education are awarded by the Illinois Auxiliary for a minimum or \$500.00 up to a maximum of \$2,000.00 each year in June, as funds are available.

- 1. The applicant must be at least a freshman in college having completed one full semester with at least 8 credit hours of study. Seniors in high school may NOT apply.
- 2. No person may receive more than one award from the Illinois Auxiliary during his or her academic career. There cannot be more than two awards per family per year. A permanent list of recipients will be kept in the scholarship files.
- 3. In addition to the completed application form, the applicant must submit the following:
  - A letter from the applicant with personal data, family size, explanation of need for scholarship monies, and career plans. Also include information about participation in high school, college, and community activities as well as work experience. Knowledge of and/or working experiences with plumbing industry may be included, but is not necessary.
  - Three letters of recommendation.
    - One letter must be from a sponsor who is a member in good standing of the Illinois PHCC Auxiliary.
    - The other two letters must be from people who know the applicant personally and can attest to the applicant's character. They may also provide additional pertinent information such as academic performance and involvement in extra-curricular activities. Knowledge of parents does not necessarily qualify them for having knowledge of applicant.
  - Photo of the applicant.
  - Official transcripts—see details on application form.
- The deadline for submitting the application is May 23, 2025.
  - Application must be postmarked no later than this date and include all the information required. If it is incomplete, application materials will be discarded and applicant will not be considered for a scholarship. Applicants may resubmit the following year.
