Third, the entire day will give you a unique and welcoming chance to catch up and network with peers from all areas of your industry and end it by enjoying a complimentary closing dinner and reception with a free raffle.

For our out-of-town visitors, two hotels are on site (with more nearby) and the free parking for everyone is no problem with the large lot and covered garage. Tickets (no cost) can be picked up from your wholesalers, manufacturers' reps, at the union halls, at contractor association events, in this newsletter, and on our state chapter website (www.ilphcc.org). You can also get tickets at the door at Drury Lane on March 20.

The program speakers during the CE class we have lined up include Brian Yelton (Inland Sales); Brian Black (Cast Iron Soil Pipe Institute); David VanWy (JULIE OneCall) and officials from the IDPH Plumbing Program. Attendees will take part in the class in a world



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class (and very comfortable) theater setting. 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RESOURCES AND RESPONSIBILITIES FOR OSHA REPORTING AND RECORDKEEPING

As we embark on a new year, the opportunity for fresh starts and renewed commitments beckons, especially for those responsible for OSHA recordkeeping. This time of year, signals not only the closure of the previous year's records but also the imperative to initiate and manage the 2025 OSHA Injury and Illness Logs. In this article, we will delve into the essential responsibilities outlined in OSHA's Part 1904, explore the nuances of exceptions for smaller businesses, and discuss the functionalities of the Injury Tracking Application (ITA). With a comprehensive approach to essential documents and reporting requirements, we aim to equip you with the information necessary to navigate this crucial aspect of workplace safety and compliance effectively.

Eighty percent of private sector employers are exempt from maintaining OSHA Forms 300, 300A, and 301, collectively referred to as OSHA Injury and Illness Logs. OSHA has set minimum employee thresholds to reduce the compliance burden on smaller businesses and has specific exemptions for low-hazard industries. Employers who did not exceed a company-wide peak of 11 employees at any time during 2025 are not required to maintain these logs. Sectors such as retail, professional services, restaurants, and bars may be exempt due to being classified as low-hazard industries. A comprehensive list of exempt industries based on NAICS codes can be found on the OSHA.gov recordkeeping section. Regardless of exemptions, all employers must still report work-related fatalities and severe injuries to OSHA.

All work-related fatalities must be reported to OSHA within 8 hours, while in-patient hospitalizations, amputations, or loss of an eye must be reported within 24 hours. Reports can be submitted via phone to an OSHA area office or through the hotline at 1-800-312-OSHA (6742). Additionally, there is an option to file a report online (not via email) at <https://www.osha.gov/ords/ser/serform.html>. When reporting serious incidents, be prepared to provide your contact and business information, along with a brief description of the incident. An employer representative should make the report. Common inquiries about reporting injuries often revolve around the definitions of in-patient hospitalization and work-relatedness. Detailed discussions on these topics are too extensive for this article, but know that emergency room visits where the employee is "treated and released" are not considered in-patient hospitalizations. Motor vehicle accidents that result in death or injury on highways, public streets, or while traveling on commercial transportation are not reportable unless these are the employee's place of business (i.e., construction workers, flight attendants). All reportable incidents must be recorded, while most recordable incidents are not reported.

Work-related deaths, injuries, and illnesses must be captured on the compilation of OSHA forms: 300, 300A and 301. Notably, workers' compensation and OSHA injury and illness recordkeeping are different from one another. The suite of OSHA recording forms² and

instructions can be found on OSHA's website. The OSHA Form 301 or equivalent must be completed within seven calendar days of becoming aware of any work-related incident and be retained for five years. The Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission Form 45: Employer's First Report of Injury is recognized as equivalent to OSHA Form 301. OSHA Form 300 includes sensitive information related to employee health and must be managed to protect employee confidentiality. This form records details of all work-related incidents that involve loss of consciousness, restricted work activity, job transfers, days away from work, or medical treatment beyond first aid. Significant work-related injuries and illnesses diagnosed by a healthcare professional are also documented in Form 300. OSHA Form 300A, which summarizes the data from Form 300, requires certification by an executive official and must be posted for employee access between February 1 and April 30, regardless of whether any work-related injuries or illnesses occurred during the previous year. For some employers, record-keeping data must be submitted electronically to OSHA.

Not all businesses are required to submit captured data to the Injury Tracking Application (ITA)³. The application is a secure website where employers can upload or manually enter OSHA 300 log data. The upload requirement is tied to the number of employees and the NAICS industry classification. OSHA has developed a web application tool⁴ to help employers determine if they are required to upload data into the ITA.

The Illinois On-Site Safety and Health Consultation Program can be an invaluable resource for employers who notice their OSHA 300 is too full for comfort. While the Illinois Department of Labor cannot help you fill out the forms nor provide assistance with your ITA account, we do offer free and confidential safety and health assistance to small and medium-sized businesses. Consultation services include on-site visits, air sampling, program assistance, and training, all of which can contribute to creating a safer and healthier work environment while also potentially lowering your worker's compensation insurance. This program, brought to you at no cost by the State of Illinois, can provide the support and guidance you need to identify hazards, develop a hierarchy of controls for those hazards, and create an enduring safety and health program. This annual list highlights the most frequently cited violations that inspectors find in workplaces across the nation. It accounts for hazards that can lead to preventable injuries, illnesses, and deaths.¹

OSHA Top 10 Most Frequently Cited Standards

By reviewing these frequently cited standards, organizations can identify and address gaps. This can help prevent injuries, illnesses, or costly violations. For the most recent fiscal year, the top 10 OSHA hazards are¹:

IRS ANNOUNCES MILEAGE RATES FOR 2026

The Internal Revenue Service has announced that the optional standard mileage rate for business use of automobiles has increased by 2.5 cents in 2026, while the mileage rate for vehicles used for medical purposes will decrease by half a cent, reflecting updated cost data and annual inflation adjustments.

Optional standard mileage rates are used to calculate the deductible costs of operating vehicles for business, charitable, and medical purposes. Additionally, the optional standard mileage rate may be used to calculate the deductible costs of operating vehicles for moving purposes for certain active-duty members of the Armed Forces, and now, under the One, Big, Beautiful Bill, certain members of the intelligence community.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2026, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car, van, pickup or panel truck will be:

- 72.5 cents per mile driven for business use, up 2.5 cents from 2025.
- 20.5 cents per mile driven for medical purposes, down a half cent from 2025.
- 20.5 cents per mile driven for moving purposes for certain active-duty members of the Armed Forces (and now certain members of the intelligence community), reduced by a half cent from last year.
- 14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations, equal to the rate in 2025.

The rates apply to fully-electric and hybrid automobiles, as well as gasoline and diesel-powered vehicles.

Use of the standard mileage rates is optional. Taxpayers may instead choose to calculate the actual costs of using their vehicle.

Taxpayers using the standard mileage rate for a vehicle they own and use for business must choose to use the rate in the first year the automobile is available for business use. Then, in later years, they can choose to use the standard mileage rate or actual expenses.

Notice-2026-10 contains the optional 2026 standard mileage rates, as well as the maximum automobile cost used to calculate mileage reimbursement allowances under a fixed-and variable rate plan. The notice also provides the maximum fair market value of employer-provided automobiles first made available to employees for personal use in 2026 for which employers may calculate mileage allowances using a cents-per-mile valuation rule or the fleet-average-valuation rule.

AUXILIARY SCHOLARSHIP RULES

Scholarships for college or vocational education are awarded by the Illinois Auxiliary for a minimum of \$500.00 up to a maximum of \$2,000.00 each year in June, as funds are available.

1. The applicant must be at least a freshman in college having completed one full semester with at least 8 credit hours of study. Seniors in high school may NOT apply.
2. No person may receive more than one award from the Illinois Auxiliary during his or her academic career. There cannot be more than two awards per family per year. A permanent list of recipients will be kept in the scholarship files.
3. In addition to the completed application form, the applicant must submit the following:
 - A letter from the applicant with personal data, family size, explanation of need for scholarship monies, and career plans. Also include information about participation in high school, college, and community activities as well as work experience. Knowledge of and/or working experiences with plumbing industry may be included, but is not necessary.
 - Three letters of recommendation.
 - One letter must be from a sponsor who is a member in good standing of the Illinois PHCC Auxiliary.
 - The other two letters must be from people who know the applicant personally and can attest to the applicant's character. They may also provide additional pertinent information such as academic performance and involvement in extra-curricular activities. Knowledge of parents does not necessarily qualify them for having knowledge of applicant.
 - Official transcripts—see details on application form.
4. **The deadline for submitting the application is May 22, 2026.**
 - Application must be postmarked no later than this date and include all the information required. If it is incomplete, application materials will be discarded and applicant will not be considered for a scholarship. Applicants may resubmit the following year.
 - All documents may be submitted digitally by emailing to jgmcw@comcast.net.
 - The scholarship committee will have the final decision in awarding these scholarships. If you have any further questions, please feel free to contact Gail McWilliams.

ILLINOIS PHCC PAST PRESIDENT'S CLUB SCHOLARSHIP FUND

1. Name of the Scholarship Fund shall be the "Illinois PHCC Assn. Past President's Club Scholarship Award".
2. Scholarship is established through dues income to Past President's Club.
3. A scholarship shall be awarded to an individual who has been nominated by a member of the Illinois PHCC Past President's Club who has been a member in good standing for the past two years.
4. Applicant must have the following qualifications:
 - a. Applicant must be a member of the senior class or graduate of a secondary school.
 - b. Pursue or desire to pursue courses of study such as may prepare them to serve or to advance the interest of the plumbing-heating-cooling industry.
5. The President of the Past President's Club shall be the Chairman and appoint two members to assist him in selecting the Scholarship Winner.
6. In no case shall more than one Scholarship be awarded to any one applicant, but the Scholarship Committee may award more than one scholarship at their discretion.
7. Scholarships shall be awarded at an event of the Illinois PHCC in June 2026.
8. The Executive Director shall be directed to inform the applicant who will be awarded the Scholarship.
9. Applicants not winning the award may be eligible to apply the following year.
10. The Scholarship money shall be made payable to the school of the applicant's choice. If the winner has changed schools since applying, he or she shall notify the IL PHCC Executive Director immediately.
11. If a recipient should drop out of school during the year, the balance of the award should be returned to the Past President's Club.
